Rabbit year omamori will be available from midnight, January 1.

There are ample supplies of the Eto Zodiac brocade omamori with a bell, however only a limited number of the specialty omamori with a Rabbit motif.

2023 is the year of the Water Rabbit.

The Water Rabbit year is a time of peace, calm and healing, unlike the tumultuous Water Tiger year.

It is a year that will present resolutions - - some favorable, some not - - to many of our problems from the past 4 years.

Enjoy the Water Rabbit year as one of relaxation, rejuvenation and pleasure as the 2024 Wood Dragon

will be a year of extremely volatile and unpredictable energy and happenings.

The Tshirt for 2023 is an ocean motif that symbolizes the strength, power, mystery and boundlessness of the Water element in Asian philosophy.

Get a Rabbit omamori if you were born in the years of the Rabbit, Sheep, Boar, Dog or Rooster to help with any challenges.



Please bring your old *omamori*, *ofuda*, *kumade*, *hamaya*, etc (any religious article blessed at a shrine or temple) on or before **January 7**.

It takes volunteers a few weeks to

painstakingly remove all metal, plastic and other toxic trim from old omamori in prep for the annual Sagicho burning ceremony.

2023 Sagicho will be held on 1/22.

#### **WE DO NOT ACCEPT:**

- Kadomatsu, bamboo and pine branches, plants
- New Years decorations, Saiwaigami papers, newsletters, packaging, envelopes and containers that omamori were packaged in (please discard all packaging prior to using your omamori)
- Mochi, foodstuff, Sacred sand, Sacred salt (please take these out of the package and use them do not discard)
- Dolls, plush toys, souvenirs from Japan
- Ihai tablets, urns, funeral photos, religious paraphenalia, flags
- Personal items jewelry, photos, letters, books, clothing, etc

If you are not able to properly dispose of your *Juyohin* (omamori, ofuda, etc from a shrine or temple), please:

- place them in a paper bag
- sprinkle Hawaiian salt
- thank the omamori for their protection
- discard it with your regular trash

A new phenomena called *Saisaki-mode* began in Japan in 2020, due to COVID-19.

In Japan, millions visit shrines and temples on the first three days of the new year.

Instead of visiting a shrine on January 1, we are calling out to

the community to visit the shrine in December to pray for an early and auspicious start of the new year.

This new practice is called *Saisaki Mo-de,* literally "visiting the shrine early for happiness."

We will be accepting

worshipers from 12/26/2022 - 2/3/2023 in a move to spread out crowds.

All worship will be done "Japan style" by praying on your own.

Stay safe and beat the crowds with *Saisaki mo-de* and our Omamori Early Section days.

*O-nusa* is an ancient implement made of hemp and paper, used in purification rituals.

Again, this new years, special hemp strips combined with *shide* zigzag paper and hemp rope will be inserted into the *Shimenawa* rope and hung from the *torii* gate.

By walking under this special *O-nusa*, one will be undergoing symbolic purification - - this will serve the sane purpose as having a Priest's assistant wave a *Gohei* wand over your heads at New Years.

Looking at the changing landscape of the community and the immense challenges presented by COVID-19, a few improvements were made to keep the shrine healthy and vibrant.

We continue to strive to perpetuate the spiritual richness of Shinto for present and future generations.

# CALENDAR

Water was found coming through the basement walls, pooling in one of the basement bathrooms.

535 Plumbing was called to find the root of the problem which turned out to be a burst water pipe in the *Shinsenjo* room, directly above the basement bathroom.

Instead of breaking apart the wall, Rev.
Takizawa suggested the old line be capped and a pipe be run through the exterior wall of the back of the shrine, into an unused cleanout.

The water supply was

deactivated for about a week.

A new flashing was installed to create a water tight seal and the pipe was tied back into the 4" cast iron cleanout, directly under the area where the new water pipe was to be installed.

Luckily there were no system backups which could have come up in between the wall, requiring demolition of the tile wall in the basement bathroom.

A vent was added to the roof, bringing the project to a finish in about 3 hours.



This male climbed the fence and entered shrine property from Kama Lane at around 4 am on 12/19.

He appeared on video surveillance and was thought to have exited by climbing the Olomea Street fence.

Rev. Takizawa found him around 7 am, sleeping under the eaves of the shrine.

This same male entered shrine property about 3 weeks ago, wielding a metal rod - - bashing the *torii, komainu* lions, stone basin, concrete steps, etc.

Police were immediately called as Preschool



was in session and because of the violence displayed by this individual in the past.

The intruder left in the presence of 3 officers, leaving all his trash.
